

On February 3rd, an earnest crew of ten showed up at the Rooms in response to an appeal for assistance with housekeeping chores. After making quick work of those tasks, the group adjourned to the Castle Room to engage in a spirited discussion of possible renovations of the third floor "lounge" over sandwiches. Initial courses of action considered for the room include:

- Opening a hole in the wall at the south end of the lounge to find out what's behind it and potentially use the space for built-in bookshelves.
- Developing an idea of how many bookcases are needed for the room.
- Looking into wainscoting options.
- Consider installing a rail to affix pictures to.
- Inventory our paintings and determine which may be suitable for exhibit in this room.
- Identify furniture needed and find out if members will donate suitable pieces in good or nearly new condition.

Other unrelated projects the house committee hopes to complete this year include repairing the stone staircase at the front of the house, and repairing or replacing the front windows on the second and third floors.
